## Outreach for Care Solace



Staff has supported outreach efforts for Care Solace in the city magazine, website, and a news release. ## Outreach for Potrero Interchange Project Phase II

In partnership with RCTC, staff continues to expand outreach related to the upcoming construction of the Potrero Interchange Project Phase II. Previous forms of outreach include an in-person HOA meeting, letters to residents and businesses in Olivewood and Western Knolls, as well as entries on social media and the city website. Future outreach will include a fact sheet, social media campaign, and a dynamic webpage.

## Outreach for Billboard Survey

To gain feedback regarding the city’s current and proposed billboard aesthetics, staff supported the development and outreach efforts of a community survey, including advertisements on social media and the city website’s spotlights.

## Youth Council Presentation

On December 9, Public Information Officer (PIO) Julie Van Hook engaged with the Beaumont Youth Council through an informative presentation on marketing and communications.

This discussion highlighted the importance of a PIO’s role in building community trust through transparency and accessibility within various channels, such as news releases and social media. Additionally, it emphasized the importance of bridging communication gaps when addressing the public’s needs, interests, and concerns.

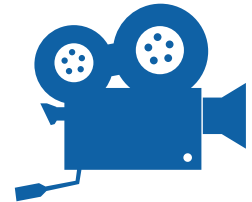
## Wayfinding Signs

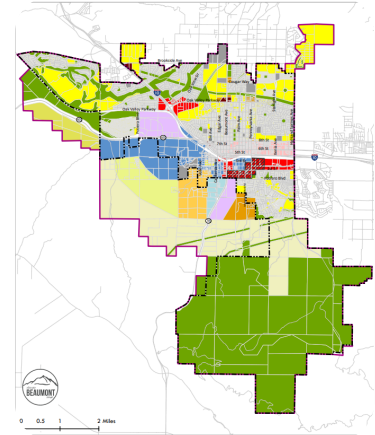


# COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

## Key Updates

**Zoning Code Update / Elevate Beaumont 2040:** The City Council acted on recommended ordinances to implement the Elevate Beaumont 2040 General Plan and establish a clearer, more user-friendly framework for managing growth through the Zoning Code Update.

Additional actions included provisions to expand the registration of vacant and abandoned properties and to update food truck regulations. The land use and entitlement provisions of these ordinances are anticipated to take effect on January 16, 2026.



## BUILDING & SAFETY

**Regency Center's Target:** Permits were issued for the anchor tenant for the building and associated on- and off-site improvements. The technical plan checks were approved for the exterior building, and staff is awaiting outside agency approvals for permit issuance.

**Beaumont Village:** Commercial retail and restaurant development is anticipated at the northwest corner of Oak Valley Parkway and Beaumont Avenue. To streamline review, the City received “at-risk” filings prior to the required map registration (by July 2026) with the Riverside County Surveyor and Assessor-County Clerk-Recorder. In addition, a tentative map and entitlement time extension request were submitted to support the processing of permit applications. No extensions will be provided on the former 2022 Building Code.

## COMMUNITY ENHANCEMENT

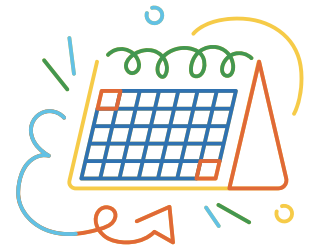


**Removal of signs in public right-of-way (ROW):** Staff determined that the City may remove and store (at the owner’s expense) any prohibited signage that pose hazards to pedestrian or vehicular traffic. This includes advertisements, signage, and/or posters that are attached to public right-of-way infrastructure and/or utility poles. This supports the intent of the City’s Signs Ordinance to promote safe, orderly, and visually appropriate signage while respecting free speech and minimizing public disruptions.

# COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

## Upcoming Alternate Schedules

With the addition of a new Code Enforcement/Community Enhancement Officer, regular after-hours coverage will commence in January 2026 to better respond to calls for service.



## Staff Recognition

Ambur Scharf was selected as the new Code Enforcement / Community Enhancement Officer. Ambur Scharf comes to us from San Bernardino County, bringing experience in rapid response operations related to animal control, food truck and mobile/sidewalk vending, and homelessness issues.

Staff looks forward to working with Ambur to establish regular after-hours coverage to better respond to calls for service.



## FIRE PREVENTION

The Four Seasons community meeting and walkthrough was attended to discuss concerns from the HOA, developer and landowner, state agencies, and the city with regards to the maintenance of the conservation area based on concerns from residents over potential fires.

The developer, K. Hovnanian, coordinated with the Inland Empire Resource Conservation District (IERCD), a public agency conservancy, for authorization to work with the Riverside County Fire Department. The developer's team provided key concept updates on the conservation easement agreement and long-term management plan for public information. Negotiations between the developer and the conservancy are ongoing.

Before February 15 (nesting season), IERCD and Chief Hopkins' team will conduct further coordination for the interim site restoration and thinning work.

The Four Seasons team will stand by to schedule a site restoration and thinning project "town hall" information session, with the date to be determined and the anticipated project schedule.

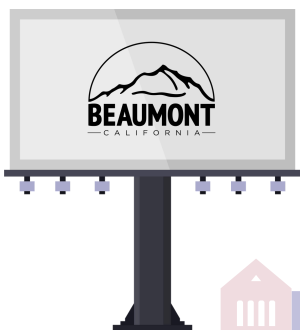
## PLANNING

<b>Tentative Tract Map 38914</b>	City Council approved a tentative map to create 19 single-family residential lots on a subdivision of 5.72 acres near Michigan Avenue, E 11 <sup>th</sup> Street, and E 12 <sup>th</sup> Street.
<b>Noble Creek Specific Plan</b>	City Attorney reviewed the settlement agreement to ensure that any liabilities were addressed with ongoing processing. Corrections were made to the proposed Noble Creek Specific Plan for the development of 586 residential dwelling units on approximately 94 acres. Further environmental review is required. 
<b>Beaumont Village</b>	A request for tree(s) removal, grading, and building permit review was received prior to the final map recordation. Staff received a time extension and “at-risk” filings for review by Building and Safety, provided the map is recorded before expiration.  The developer is working towards conditions and impact mitigation measure compliance and anticipates the map will record prior to tentative map expiration. 
<b>Beaumont Commerce Center</b>	The applicant and staff are working together to create a specific plan for industrial and commercial uses and the potential annexation of 570 acres into the City. 
<b>Beaumont Heights/Orbis</b>	Staff is conducting weekly meetings to potentially create a specific plan for industrial and warehouse uses totaling approximately 5,275,306 square feet and the potential annexation of 557.96 acres near the intersection of SR 79 and Laird Road.  A specific plan, pre-zone, and general plan amendment, along with a plan of services and fiscal impact report, must first be analyzed and approved prior to annexation proceedings.

<b>Oak Valley Village</b>	Staff expedited current reviews for permit issuance and conditions and mitigation measure compliance.
<b>Climate Action and Adaption Plan</b>	<p>In coordination with the City Manager’s Office and the Public Information Officer, staff supported public outreach related to the plan development of a foundational framework that addresses climate change and sustainability.</p> <p>This plan would help Beaumont meet regional emission reduction targets and strengthen climate resilience, including preparedness for extreme heat, wind events, and building durability.</p>
<b>Title 16 - Subdivisions</b>	Documents were prepared to present to the Planning Commission to streamline the processing of tentative and final maps to facilitate managed growth and foster adequate infrastructure and services to meet needs.
<b>Digital / Electronic Billboards Workshop</b>	A survey was released to determine the community’s support for current and future billboard aesthetics and visual clutter. This would prepare potential provisions that allow limited, well-regulated signage, could generate new revenue streams, and improve design consistency through modern standards.
<b>Applying for Prohousing Designation Program</b>	<p>Documents were prepared to request Council authorization to participate in and apply for the state’s Prohousing Designation Program.</p> <p>This will promote funding eligibility and support the facilitation of affordable housing efforts that are already underway.</p>

- Tour of Beaumont's key commercial areas, including retail, industrial, logistics, and available properties

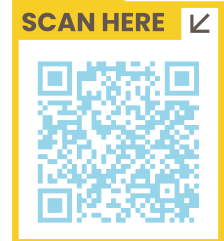

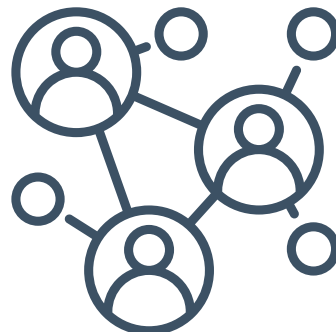

## Milestones & Key Updates

**Do Not Block Signage:** On December 18, the Streets Crew installed “Do Not Block” signage at the intersections of Highland Springs Avenue and 1<sup>st</sup> Street, 2<sup>nd</sup> Street, and 6<sup>th</sup> Street. This will help keep these heavily traveled intersections clear and safe for everyone. Stopping inside the intersections can create traffic hazards and block emergency access. Vehicles that block the marked areas are subject to a fine of \$285.



**Champions Drive Signage and Striping:** In a continued effort to improve traffic flow and safety, new pavement marking and line extension, along Champions Drive near Desert Lawn Drive. The white dotted line is intended to improve safety by separating the left turn lane from the through lane that continues beyond the intersection.



**Pennsylvania Ave. Grade Separation:** The final agreement with RCTC was approved at the RCTC committee meeting on December 10. This agreement authorizes RCTC to complete the Pennsylvania Avenue Grade Separation Project. The City successfully completed the environmental documentation required to secure 50 million dollars in TCEP funding.

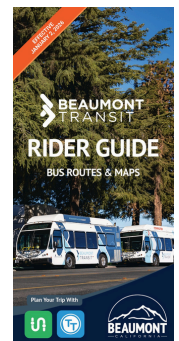

**Solar Project (WW26-04):** Finalizing electrical plans and CAD drawings for bid package.

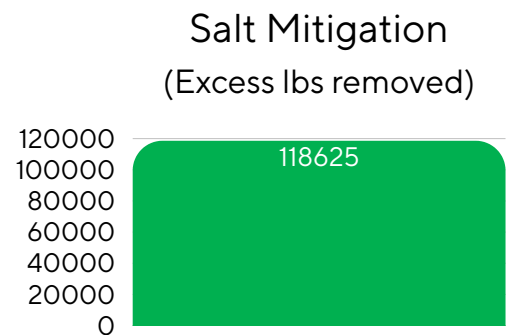
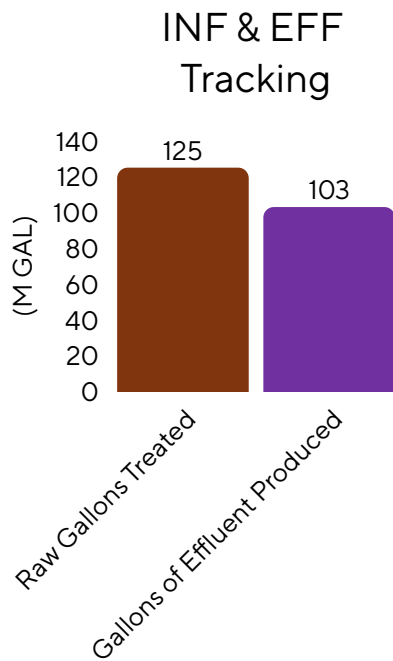
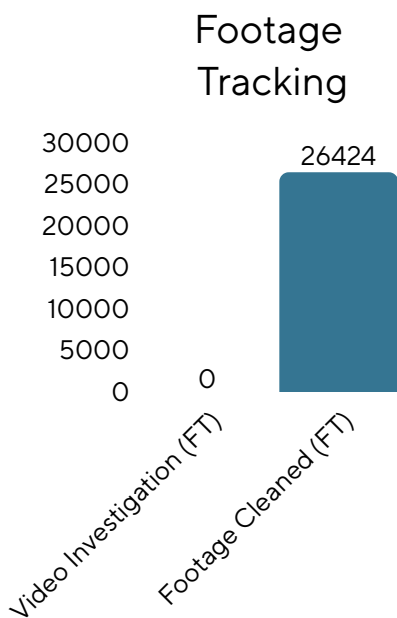
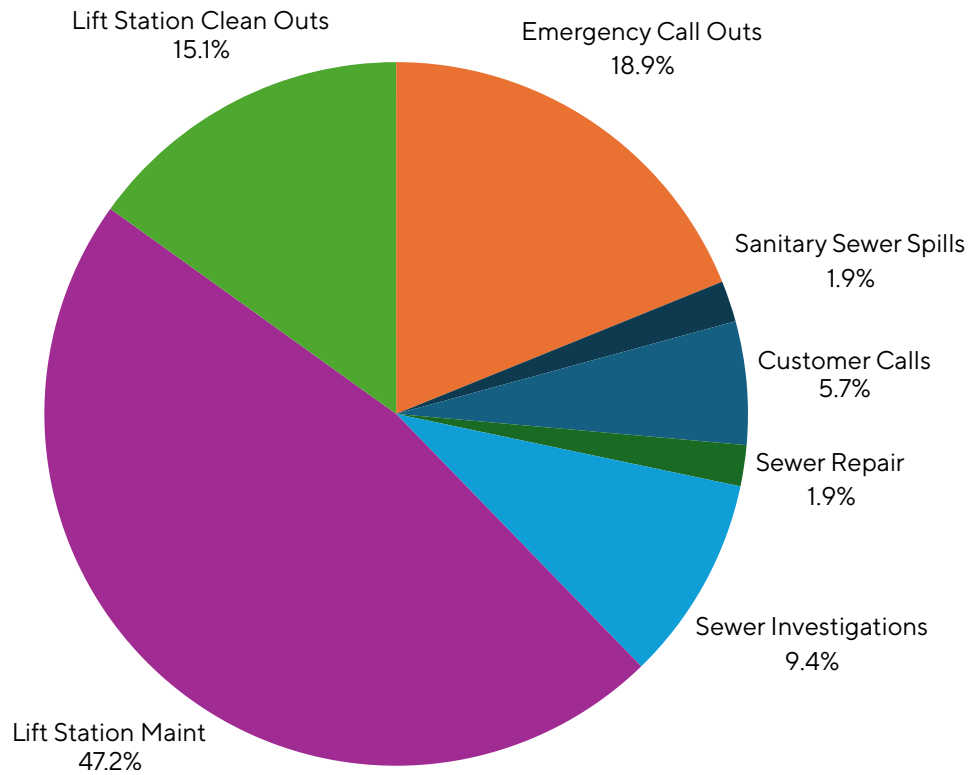
